### What is the Christmas Kettle Campaign?

The campaign is a fundraising effort that occurs each year. In multiple locations throughout Bermuda, the iconic red kettle gives the public opportunity to donate to support the work of The Salvation Army during the Christmas season and throughout the year.

### What happens to the money raised?

Funds raised through Christmas kettles, together with other sources of funds, help provide direct, compassionate, hands-on service to more than 32,670 vulnerable people each year in Bermuda.

### How does The Salvation Army determine where the funds will be used?

Each kettle location is organized and managed by a local Salvation Army unit. The funds raised stay in the community in which they were donated.



## VOLUNTEER AND CHANGE A LIFE.

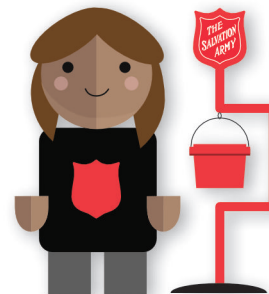

### History of the Kettle

In 1891, Captain Joseph McFee wanted to help the vulnerable in San Francisco during the Christmas season, but he didn't know where to get funding. He remembered, during his earlier days in England, seeing a large kettle where passengers coming off nearby boats were able to toss coins to help the poor. Captain McFee placed a similar pot at the Oakland Ferry Landing and encouraged the public to “Keep the Pot Boiling.” He collected enough money to host a Christmas dinner for the poor.
